Thank you for your interest in the Clark County 4-H Program! 4-H is having **FUN**, making **FRIENDS** and learning new **SKILLS** through club involvement, project work, camping experiences and community service.

Who Can Join 4-H? You must enroll by April 15 to participate in Fair!

- Any youth ages 5 and in Kindergarten through age 18 as of January 1 of the current year may join 4-H.
- The Cloverbud Program, designed especially for youth age 5 and in Kindergarten through 2nd grade, is a fun, cooperative, and non-competitive activity based program.
- Youth age 8 and in the 3rd grade through age 18 are eligible to enroll with one or more 4-H projects and participate in a variety of competitive as well as educational and recreational 4-H programs. Youth age 9 as of January 1st regardless of grade are eligible to enroll with projects as well.

What Does It Cost To Join 4-H?

- The Clark County 4-H Program has an annual activity fee. 4-H project members, youth age 8 and in the 3rd grade through age 18 are required to pay a **\$25 per member fee**. Cloverbuds, youth age 5 and in Kindergarten through 2nd grade, are required to pay a **\$5 per cloverbud** activity fee.
- Members are responsible for the cost of project books (\$8 or more) + sales tax, additional costs for project supplies and fees charged for special programs like 4-H Camp.
- Clubs may have additional costs associated with meetings and programs offered at the club level.

What is the 4-H Family Guide?

- A 4-H Family Guide is enclosed or is available on-line at http://clark.osu.edu/. This booklet provides you with a complete listing of 4-H project opportunities for the current 4-H year.
- We encourage you to spend some time reviewing the project offerings and connecting your project interest with a 4-H club.

How Can You Find a 4-H Club?

- Use the enclosed 4-H flyer for your school district to find a 4-H club. You are welcome to join anywhere in the county, however most families find it more convenient to join a club close to home. You can directly contact the club advisor listed on the flyer or contact the OSU Extension, Clark County Office for more information.

What Questions Should You Ask to Find the Right Club for Your Child and Family?

There are more than 50 4-H clubs in Clark County from which to choose. We encourage you to contact several club volunteers and ask a few questions to find the best club for you and your family.

- When, where and how often does your club meet?
- What happens at your club meetings?
- What types of projects, activities, events and programs do you offer your members?
- What are the financial expectations of club members (club dues, fundraising, project expenses, etc.)?
- What do your club members gain from their 4-H experience?
