Workshop A – 9:00-10:30 a.m.

- 601 Are You Bleeding Green on the 4-H Volunteer Meter? Both**
When a 4-H member looks back to their 4-H participation, will they remember how you worked with them to be a well-rounded "champion kid" with high standards/values or were "negative things" tolerated/allowed to happen? Did you provide opportunities for members to enhance skills in leadership, communication, interpersonal skills, good sportsmanship, citizenship and decision making, plus build their self-esteem? Or, were you worried about having the "right" animal, the "right" fashion look, the "right" everything and doing whatever it took to bring home the champion ribbons for your members? This session will provide a hands-on learning experience, interaction and discussion on what 4-H should be teaching members through their personal development and attainment of high values. Participants will talk about the definitions of competition/winning, sportsmanship, citizenship and leadership, plus explore ways to make the 4-H member experience more meaningful.
